Christian Unity Week 18th -25th January. 2025 marks the 1,700th anniversary of the first Christian Ecumenical Council, held in Nicaea, near Constantinople in 325 AD. This commemoration provides a unique opportunity to reflect on and celebrate the common faith of Christians, as expressed in the creed formulated during this council. The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2025 offers an invitation to draw on this shared heritage

and to enter more deeply into the faith that unites all Christians. The guiding biblical text for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2025 comes from John 11:17-27. The theme for the week, "Do you believe this?" (v. 26), takes its cue from the dialogue between Jesus and Martha when Jesus visited the home of Martha and Mary in Bethany following the death of their brother Lazarus. Prayer For Unity God grant us the patience to work together, bring us all together as a family. Let us work together with understanding and compassion in our hearts. Catholic Schools Week 2025 will be celebrated from 19th to 25th January, with the theme of Catholic Schools: Alive in Christ. Christ calls us together as a living faith community so that our schools, parish and families may support and animate one another. Our Catholic schools are places where faith is lived in service to one

another in a spirit of inclusion, joy, hope and belief in one another as gifts from God The second reading, of Mass today from 1 Corinthians 12:4-11, speaks of the variety of gifts given to us by the Spirit. The gospel reading is a foretelling of the Eucharistic celebration in the account of the Wedding at Cana (Jn 2:1-11). Both readings provide inspiration for the themes of thanksgiving, the abundance of gifts given to us by the Spirit, the call to change so that we become more alive in Christ, the call to be Christian and the value of each person and each gift. This marries well with the educating nature at the core of our catholic schools: to bring out what is within and to bring out the divine qualities of the soul as well

Todays Gospel Cana: New wine for life The human side of the gospel today is the huge need of a young couple on the best day of their lives. Jesus hears of their need and the result is the wine for the wedding, but more so, it is the promise of the fullness of God. We look for the fullness of life in money, food, travel, security, reputation- none last. Only the simplest joys of life really satisfy in the end, like the joy of love, the thrill of friendship, the caring in family and the ways we enjoy the goodness of creation. A man asked once in the hospice at the end of his life -'what is happiness?' 'Find happiness now' was his answer - 'be satisfied, be grateful, for what you have, for what you have received, for what God has given you.' There is a fullness of life in being happy with who I am, what I have... and asking God for what he knows I need. No matter what our .age, we can do good for others, we can share the graces of life and the soul can grow. That's what I hope can happen for me as life goes on. In any group of people, some look happy and some look miserable. The happiest are not always the ones who had or are having the easiest life. They are the ones who have found peace with themselves, others and God.



Unity

Pope Francis on the Jubilee Year of Hope Pope Francis highlights the Jubilee as a time for a new beginning, rooted in the transformative power of God's Kingdom, drawing on the example of John the Baptist, a "great prophet of hope." Hope, is not merely "a habit or a character trait", but a "strength to be asked for" and also a

gift of God that spurs Christians "to start again on the journey of life." As the Gospel of Luke tells us, it requires a recognition of our human smallness in the face of God's greatness. "It does not depend on us, but on the Kingdom of God," where even the "least" become great, the Pope said. Pope Francis also addressed the struggles of faith, drawing on John the Baptist's moments of doubt during his imprisonment. These doubts, the Pope noted, resonate with the challenges faced by Christians today navigating a world where "many Herods" still "oppose the Kingdom of God." Yet, he stressed, the Gospel provides an antidote to this despair through its transformative teachings, particularly the Beatitudes, which chart a new path of hope. Pope Francis concluded with a call to embrace hope and renewal through service and fraternity, particularly towards the least, and through responsibility for our "common home" the Earth "so often abused and wounded."
