Todays Gospel: Jesus and Hospitality - God's Footprints The half door on the old Irish house had many functions. It kept the animals out while allowing the family to look out. It also made for openness and hospitality for all who passed by. The traveller was welcomed and the one walking by could rest for a while. We were open to the world and the world to us, and we felt safe. Hospitality was important in Jesus' time. He made many a visit to the house of Martha and Mary, staying there when he wanted to go to Jerusalem. They enjoyed having him – Mary just sat there listening to him – the stranger, now a friend, who told stories of how life could best be lived. I can imagine him telling the parables in their house The people then had a belief in the travelling and pilgrim God, the one who came our way often. The first reading is about strangers being entertained and the people didn't know that the Lord was visiting them. When we open our heart and home to the stranger and to the neighbour we are receiving God into our lives. The Indian poet Tagore writes – 'and when you left I saw God's footprints on the floor.' Our fear of break-ins and of robbery today is destroying an easy accessibility in our neighbourhoods. Casual hospitality is more difficult than in the days of the half-door. Maybe Facebook and Twitter and other social media fulfil some of this function, impersonal though it may be. We cannot live in isolation. 'Self knows that self is not enough' writes the poet, Brendan Kennelly. For friendship and love, especially when I find it in unexpected places and people, thank you, Lord.



Jesus Visits

Luke 10:38-42

Reek Sunday will be on next Sunday July 27th, It is the annual pilgrimage to Croagh Patrick and is also known as Garland Sunday. The Pilgrimage is dedicated to Saint Patrick and the theme for 2025 is "Christian Hope". Mass will be celebrated on the summit of the mountain on the hour with the first Mass at 8am and the last Mass at 2pm. Confessions will be available on the summit from 7.30am to 2pm.

Pope Leo In his address last weekend reflected on the question put to Jesus in the Gospel: "Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" The Holy Father recognized that the man's question expresses a deep desire of the human heart, which is "for an existence free from failure, evil, and death." He noted that we can never gain eternal life by force or negotiate to obtain it, but rather we must inherit it. "Eternal life, which God alone can give, is bestowed on us as an inheritance, as parents do

with their children," he said. For this reason, Pope Leo said Jesus says we must do God's will, which means loving God with all our heart and our neighbour as ourself. "When we do these two things, we respond to the Father's love," The Pope urged Christians to look to Jesus for the meaning of authentic love, saying that love is generous, forgiving, and expansive, never leaving us closed in on ourselves. Just as God drew near to humanity in Jesus Christ, so too are we called to care for those around us. "Imitating the example of Jesus, the Saviour of the world," he said, "we too are called to bring consolation and hope, above all to those who are experiencing discouragement and disappointment." Pope Leo XIV concluded his Angelus reflection by recalling that the supreme commandment to love God and our neighbour supersedes all human laws and gives them their true meaning. "In order to live eternally, we do not need to cheat death, but to serve life, by caring for others in this, our time together." In seeking to serve life, said the Pope, we become "artisans of peace in our daily lives."
