





As it is the feast of Saint Blaise we will have blessing of Throats at the end of ceremony




Catholic Schools Week which we celebrate this week celebrates the extraordinary call to holiness in the midst of ordinary life. Inspired by Pope Francis's reflection on Saint Carlo Acutis—canonised as the first millennial saint—this year's theme invites pupils, teachers, families, and parishes to explore the call to holiness as something both universal and accessible. Holiness is not for a few, but for all; not reserved for religious professionals or mystics, but for every student, teacher, parent, and grandparent!) living each day in friendship with Jesus Christ. Catholic schools exist to form individuals who know that their lives have a purpose and a calling.

This year's theme, "Normal Lives, Called to Holiness," resonates with the central conviction that education is a path not only to knowledge and maturity but to, sainthood. "Each of us is called to be holy by living our lives with love and by bearing witness to Christ in everything we think, do and say ."

During the year every Christian is invited to become a model of holiness and a constant witness to peace. In this age marked by so many interminable wars, by internal and social division that create mistrust and fear Pope Leo has said that Saint Francis' message of peace is needed more than ever because he points to the authentic source of peace that is Christ Himself. Pope Leo has asked the Saint's intercession to give us the courage to build bridges rather than boundaries

"Would you like to be a saint?" A girl at the back of the class was the first to respond: "I am struggling with this idea," she said. "I don't think it is for me." Another hand went up: "Oh no, definitely no ... I could never be a saint!" "It would be no fun!", said another. From the left of the room, John joined the conversation: "If I was to be a saint, I would have to stop doing many things I enjoy." It was obvious that most of the group could imagine sainthood only with great difficulty. In fact, a good number of them had very little desire to tread the road toward such a calling. Changing the line of questioning, I asked: **"Well, do you desire to be the best that you can be in life?"** Anna was the first to answer: "Sure, we all desire to be the best that we can be in life." "Well, that gives us far more hope of achieving something worthwhile," said John. It seemed that every one of my students wished to be the best that they could be. While very few wished to be saints. It took considerable time to explain that "to be the best that you can be" and "to be a saint" might be much closer than they thought. **For a saint is someone who, with God's help, has grown into the best and finest version of who they were called to be**
